Excerpt from Constitution ~ Shoalhaven P C Users Group Inc ~ as amended 16 Feb 1996.

The purposes of the Group are to conduct, on a non-profit basis, activities aimed at the effective utilisation of the personal computer, with particular reference to IBM and IBM compatible products, and to endeavour to achieve such effective utilisation by means of:

- a) advancing computer literacy,
- b) keeping members abreast of developments in computing and information technology and enabling members to exchange information and experience,
- c) providing a forum for the exchange of views amongst computer users and between computer users and the computer industry,
- d) co-operating, supporting or joining with, or in, other organisations with similar purposes
- e) undertaking other activities beneficial to the Group in order to further its purposes.

The officers of the Group shall be: a President, a Treasurer, a Secretary.

Each officer of the Group shall hold office until the annual general meeting next after the date of his or her election but is eligible for re-election.

The committee shall consist of: the officers of the Group; and 5 ordinary members, each of whom shall be elected at the annual meeting of the Group in each year.

Each ordinary member of the committee shall, subject to these rules, hold office until up to and including the conclusion of the annual general meeting next after the date of his or her election but is eligible for re-election.

Public Wi-Fi

Public Wi-Fi is available just about everywhere, from the local coffee shop to the hotels and airports you visit while traveling.



Wi-Fi has made our lives a little easier, but it also poses security risks to the personal information available on our laptops and smartphones.

There are basically two kinds of public Wi-Fi networks: secured and unsecured. Regardless of the connection type, you should always use public Wi-Fi with caution.

Don't access personal bank accounts, or sensitive personal data, on unsecured public networks. Even secured networks can be risky. Use your best judgment if you must access these accounts on public Wi-Fi.

Don't shop online when using public Wi-Fi. Sure, shopping doesn't seem like it involves sensitive data, but making purchases online requires personal information that could include bank account and retailer login credentials.

Shopping isn't something you want to do on an unsecured Wi-Fi network.

Monitor your Bluetooth connectivity. Bluetooth in the home is an amazing feature on many smart devices. However, leaving Bluetooth on while in public places can pose a huge risk to your cybersecurity.

Bluetooth connectivity allows various devices to communicate with each other, and a hacker can look for open Bluetooth signals to gain access to your devices.

Keep this function on your phone and other devices locked down when you leave your home, office, or similar secured area.

Microsoft's fascination for its own smartphone is not dead, yet.

After failed Windows smartphones, the company has showcased a foldable smartphone – Surface Duo – that is more like the newly-launched Samsung Galaxy Fold and would run on Google's Android.

The Surface Duo will have two 5.6-inch displays that expand to an 8.3-inch screen.

At an event in New York late 2019, Microsoft said



that it would release Surface Duo in 2020.

Microsoft tell us:

"Surface Duo is the first Surface to fit in your pocket. Surface Duo brings together the best of Microsoft productivity experiences, Android apps and Surface hardware design into a single device you can take anywhere."

"It has two paper-thin 5.6-inch screens that unfold to 8.3 inches, and just like Surface Neo, it can be used in a variety of modes to let you work the way you'd like," Microsoft added.

Microsoft tried hard to make its Windows-based phones successful, but failed as it could not compete against Google's Android and Apple's iOS.

The Surface Duo will be able to run apps from the Google Play Store.

"With Surface Duo we are building upon Android to marry cutting edge hardware with familiar software and services," said the company.


The company also showcased Surface Neo — a dual -screen device built for productivity on Windows 10X, an expression of Windows 10.

A 360-degree full-friction hinge connects two 9-inch screens, enabling Surface Neo to adapt to whatever posture you need in the moment.

"When you open it, you have a full-size 13-inch display in the thinnest LCD in its class. It's built for productivity and multitasking like a true PC would be — running full productivity apps, with a removable keyboard and compatibility with Surface Pen and Bluetooth mouse," said Microsoft.

To support Surface Neo, Microsoft is introducing Windows 10X, an expression of Windows 10 designed for a new category of dual-screen PCs If interested, go to:
