Portrait Mode and Stage Light.

These pictures have been taken in Portrait Mode, combined with the Stage Light setting.

What Is Portrait Mode?

Portrait mode is a shooting mode in the iPhone's built-in Camera app. It uses clever software to blur the background in your photos.


With Portrait mode, the camera creates a depth-of-field effect, which lets you capture photos with a sharp focus on the subject and a blurred background.

You can add portrait mode to any photo with this new Google Photos update. ... Most recent iPhones and Androids have portrait mode, which focuses on the subject and blurs the background, making a photo look like it was taken with a high-end DSLR camera.

How does Stage Light work?

With these pictures, the Stage Light setting was used.

Stage Light is a Portrait Mode effect that makes the background completely black (as if the subject was standing under a spotlight on a stage).
