Russell recently circulated the minutes of our January meeting.

For the benefit of readers who are not members, this extract might allow you to understand what happens at a typical meeting.

Questions from non-members would be welcome...we can all learn together.



General Business:

Richard Findsen apologised for failing to advise the last meeting that Jack Korten would be absent due to a medical issue. Richard said that Jack had advised him but due to his 'Goldfish' memory he had forgotten.

Ouestions and Answers:

- Graeme Evans complained of receiving unwanted emails through his Facebook account. Richard explained that this could be stopped by turning off 'receive notifications' in the Facebook settings.
- Russell Field advised that he had installed a copy of the application 'Nord VPN' on his computer but had been unable to install it on either his iPhone or iPad. Richard suggested looking up Google for a solution as he did not think Apple would be interested in helping with a product they did not supply.
- Faye Suffolk said she repeatedly gets emails saying either her *Norton* or *McAfee* subscriptions are about to expire even though she does not use either product. Richard said to delete the emails as they are just spam.
- Geoff Spencer asked if he should put Windows 11 on his 5-6 year old computer. Richard said that Microsoft supplies a small app that runs on a computer to see if it is suitable for Windows 11. He noted that most older computers are not suitable for the latest version of Windows without modification, something he would not advise unless one was familiar with working with computer hardware.
- Barbara Baker asked for advice as to what computer she should buy. Richard said one should talk to one's computer technician. He said he preferred laptops with Intel cpu's over AMD cpu's as they don't run as hot. He suggested the new computer should have at least 8GB of RAM and preferably with a solid state drive (SSD) as they are much faster than the older hard-drives.
- Ron Lukin told of his having put an SSD on an old Council Dell laptop (2007 model) and it now runs Windows 10 very well before the update it was running Windows XP. He also said he put Windows 11 on a 10 year old Toshiba computer which is also running two other operating systems. Richard noted that he would not recommend the average person consider doing the same as it would be a considerable cost to have the work done by a professional.
- Graeme Evans asked what 'push' meant in relation to notifications. Richard explained that push meant one didn't have to ask for new items to be sent to your computer, i.e. when some new notification became available it would be 'pushed' automatically to your computer.

Other:

David Wastie gave a presentation on the use of 'Paint 3D' – a free program from Microsoft that runs on Windows computers. It was very interesting and the demonstration showed that the program is surprisingly powerful
